This is the exciting prospect The Sussex Martlets in February 2000. Plans are now under way for this tour of a lifetime. provisional The itinerary follows this forward.

The 1998 season is behind us and from a cricketing perspective it can be best described as a mixed bag with eight matches lost to inclement weather, 10 wins, 6 draws and 12 losses. More detail on these results follows later in this issue.

The developments taking place within the Club have resulted in many more issues needing to be addressed by the Committee. Indeed, too many for all to be placed on one agenda per meeting. Consequently, we have devised a new calendarisation of full Committee meetings that will now take place in January, March and September of each year. The prime function of the January meeting will be to receive the Cricket sub-Committee's report on fixtures, match managers, umpires and to sign-off on the publication of our handbook. The March meeting will finalise pre-season activity whilst the September meeting will review the season just finished. Interspersed between these full Committee meetings will be the Sub-Committee meetings which will address and progress the numerous issues pertaining to their individual remits. The sub-Committee Chairmen report on their activities in this issue of the Martlet.

Your Committee and the three Sub-Committees have worked extremely hard over the past months to maintain the forward impetus of the Club. May I take this opportunity to thank them most sincerely for their magnificent support and devotion to the Club.

Australia 2000

Our own Chairman Adrian Ford outlined the Martlet year in his "State Nation" speech and he described the much needed changes he has bought about in our Club. Members raised over £600 in the raffle which included, amongst other generously

donated gifts, London and Brighton theatre tickets, wine and champagne courtesy of Adrian Ford and Richard Moore, dinner for two at the four star Ashdown Park Hotel, a day with Channel 4 Racing donated by Lynne Callaway and vouchers from Nick Wisdom and Holmewoods Insurance Services (via David Collard). Our grateful thanks to all those who gave raffle gifts. We were pleased also to make a donation of £100 to Peter Moores's benefit for which he graciously thanked the Martlets.

1998 SEASON By John Newton

Of the 40 fixtures scheduled, 10 were won, 6 were drawn and 12 were lost. 8 were cancelled or affected by the rain and 4

other games were not played – Lancing College, Ardingly College, Warwickshire Pilgrims and Cryptics.

Rain affected 20% of games, however the old problem of members dropping out at the last minute was most evident and the cricket sub-committee will be monitoring this problem next year. The sub-committee were disappointed with the number of losses and again this will be addressed next season.

On a brighter note there were some fine performances by members with 'Bat and Ball' which resulted in wins against Midhurst, Christ's Hospital, Stragglers of Asia, Incogs, Forty Club, Bluemantles and Yellowhammers.

In superb games we just lost to the M. C. C. and drew with the Earl of Arundel's XI at the Castle.

Charlie Hartridge, John Goodacre and Richard Seager were the main run makers this season, being well supported by Richard and David Gutteridge, John Carr and Johnny Wills. Centuries were scored by Richard Seager and James Sadler.

On the bowling front Michael Harrison bowled consistently well in his first year as a senior. Ben Newton took 6 for 41 against Midhurst, Nigel Russell 5 for 90 against the Juniors and Ian Faulkner 5 for 14 against Newick. However, the outstanding performance was one Colin Oliver-Redgate against S.Y.C. with figures of 4.1 overs, 3 maidens, 1 run for 5 wickets against the cream of Sussex youth. Not bad for 50+!

The Club ran a mini-tour to the West Country and played 2 games and won 2 games!

Keith Manning, Charlie Hartridge and John Newton managed to persuade 11 members to tour. First day 17th June at North Perrott against Dorset Rangers – Sussex Martlets batted first with Neil Bushell and Alex Hoare putting on 61 for the first wicket. Alex continued to bat aggressively and shared in a partnership of 73 with Charlie Hartridge, eventually being out for a well hit 63. Charlie went on to stroke 90 not out. John Goodacre, John Newton and Mike Harrison chipped in with useful support to Charlie and the innings was declared at 262 for 5. Dorset Rangers, not helped by the rain, were never up with the run rate and were bowled out for 123 by the Martlets. Martin Krause 3 for 52, Colin Oliver-Redgate 2 for 10 and Keith Manning 3 for 11 did the damage. We then adjourned to the Hotel and enjoyed a very pleasant dinner together.

The next day we travelled into Devon to play the Dumplings at Knightshayes, a National Trust House and Gardens near Tiverton. The Martlets batted first and made 242 for 6 declared. David Gutteridge made 28, but a great stand between Charlie Hartridge, who made 73 not out and John Goodacre 87, enabled the side to amass a respectable total. Steady bowling on a wet wicket kept the Dumplings restricted and they were all out for 162. Good performances from Sandy Ross 3 for 43, Martin Krouse 3 for 3 and John Newton 2 for

26 were recorded. The Tour was judged a great success despite the rain and should be repeated.



We thank him very much for the ode and suspect it is the first poem concerning the Martlets. By the way, in case it had slipped your memory, my dictionary reminds me that a culverin is a 'large cannon or small firearm'. This seems imprecise but I suppose that the Martlets have some of both!

We are now working on other ways to celebrate by perhaps visiting the Varsity rugby match or having a day or evening at Goodwood. However, I hope that we will be able to have another lunch up at Arundel castle next year.

Down Memory Lane

It is the intention of this slot to take a trip down memory late to remember some Martlet 'greats'. I am indebted to Brian O'Gorman, who qualifies on his own account, for the following.

M.D.Nelligan 1930-1954

M.D.Nelligan was a splendid bowler, firstly for Horsham in the 1920's, Worthing in the 1930's and for Middleton subsequently, at medium-fast and later, medium pace. He approached the stumps with an upright strutting gait and delivered in-swingers with a deadly leg-cutter as a wicket taking variation. Many the batsman who related playing against him and feeling that the bowling posed no obvious difficulty until edging the perfectly pitched cutter to slip. (The leg-cutter seems to have a particular affinity to Sussex bowlers, the seaside grounds offering assistance with a touch of dampness allowing the seam to grip and the ball to do more than merely hold its line.)

Not unnaturally Hove and Middleton were M.D's happy hunting grounds. But he had surprised many on the flawless Worthing wickets of pre-war years.

He was very competitive and liked to win, being an ally, at Worthing, of the redoubtable J.K. Mathews. It was something of a double act for them to convince visitors that the pitch hid every devilment and make the mistake of asking Worthing to bat first.

Another 100 for J.K. and five more wickets for M.D.

At Middleton, post War, the process was reversed. Early morning help would reduce the London visitors to 5 or 6 down by lunch, enabling Middleton to do what they were best at chasing a target.

He was always an admirer of the Sussex professionals and often related how he had bowled at John Langridge, then at the height of his powers, keeping him quiet for an hour and a half. "But I bowled him two short ones and he hit them both for four." As a Headmaster M.D. was always vitally aware of the need to develop young players and he took over the running of the Junior Martlets in the early fifties attracting many fine players and giving the team a strong identity of its own and introducing many to the enjoyment of Martlet cricket and the Club. Quite apart from his playing ability this is his enduring legacy and the debt modern players owe him.

Golf.

John Whittaker (pictured below) reports on the Martlets Golf day he organised for members in the spring.



On April 2nd 1998 the inaugural Martlets Golf Day was held at the Mid-Sussex Golf Club, Ditchling. The idea was to bring together Martlet golfers, young and old and irrespective of handicap, to enjoy playing at this relatively new Club situated just below the South Downs over what had once been a stud farm. There was also a serious purpose to the exercise, in that the Martlets Golf Society, run for so many years in such a

dedicated and benignly efficient way by Dan Mathews, needed to recruit younger members for the future, and it was encouraging to find in a field of 24 golfers who appeared for the day several such players.

It was important to find a location that would appeal not only to golfers but to those who enjoy hitting a ball round a course and Mid-Sussex, also being relatively flat, did not sap the energy of those not used to 18 holes of golf. Many of us found the course quite long and the greens tricky with their contours making the lines difficult to read and more than one of us found water on various occasions.

Fortified by delicious bacon sandwiches and coffee on arrival, we teed off at 10 minute intervals in bright and pleasant conditions, which unfortunately deteriorated during the round making playing rather unpleasant for a short while. Nevertheless everyone survived and returned to the clubhouse well-exercised and generally having enjoyed themselves, the competition for the Martlet Trophy having been played on a Stableford basis. The results proved rather successful for two sets of brothers, David Gutteridge with a score of 41 points being the first winner of the Trophy and his brother Richard runner-up with 40 points. The winner of the over 17 handicap was Peter Riddy with 37 points and mention must also be made of his brother Jack who came third with 39 points. Significantly all these four are relatively young and although we have seen David and Richard in Martlet Golf before, it was the first time for Jack and Peter

The day concluded with an excellent three-course evening meal produced by the Club and the general feeling at the end of the day was that the occasion was one to be repeated. As the organiser it only remains for me to thank those who attended for their enthusiastic support and also all those who sent good wishes for a successful day.

Dan Mathews By Ham Whitty

John Mathews, affectionately known to everyone as Dan, has been Hon. Secretary of the Sussex Martlets Golfing Society for so long that not even he can recall exactly when he took over from his father J.K. Records indicate however that it was 1953, forty five years ago.



Dan is much too modest to admit that in his day he was a formidable match player, and when Felsted reached the semi-final of the Halford Hewitt foursomes he was one of the mainstays of the side. He won countless cups and even managed to carry his younger brother through to winning the Royal Mid-Surrey (where he now plays foursomes) in the late 50's.

Dan served in the RAF during the war and to his amazement found himself, after his plane was shot down, being interrogated by a German who had lived in Brighton and who seemed

unaware that the bomb that was dropped on the county Ground when the Martlets were playing there, failed to explode.

As a useful club cricketer Dan was a prolific hitter, once scoring a 100 in rapid time mainly in 4s and 6s, and later won a match against his old school in the last over by lofting the ball out of the ground on to the roof of the local pub, where his feat was duly celebrated after the game.

He also captained Hurlingham for years and initiated the Martlets game there, always managing to raise a good side, worthy of the Club's reputation.

However it is as secretary of the Golf that most of us will remember him. The society continues to flourish, rather differently, perhaps, from the time in the late 1930s when Dan was summoned by JK to appear, or perhaps 'disappear', might be a more appropriate way of describing the match, as it was played in a mist and Dan, with his pencil bag, a spoon, a mashie and a putter was picked to play with his father who was the only one to know his way round the course!

Now that he is retiring we would like to thank him most sincerely for his friendship and firm guidance in keeping the Martlet golfing traditions in such good heart. Dan is held in high regard and with much affection not only by his fellow Martlet golfers, but by all those who play against us for their various clubs. We all therefore hope that we may be able to persuade him to continue to play for the society in some or all of those matches which we now enjoy and which he did so much to maintain.

THE SUSSEX COUNTY CRICKET CLUB ACADEMY SPONSORED BY THE SUSSEX MARTLETS

The County's Director of Excellence, Chris Waller, last season introduced the Club's Academy which aims to take boys with outstanding potential already playing in various County youth squads on a fast track toward the First Class game. Specialist coaching, tours and fixtures against other Academies all conducted within the professional environment will aim to prepare talent for a rapid introduction to life at the top. Chris hopes that his methods will encourage the cream of Sussex's youth to stay the tough course, particularly at the most vulnerable stage, right at the beginning of their tentative careers.

Having been the benefactors of good fortune in the past, many Martlets felt that more needed to be put back into the game by those of us who continue to gain such pleasure from our sport. After discussing in detail the ambitions of the Academy with Chris Waller, the Committee felt that this was an appropriate direction for sponsorship. Richard Moore's charity, the Sandra Trust, kindly donated on behalf of the Martlets the magnificent sum of £5000, and our thanks go to him for his considerable generosity and commitment to youth Cricket.

In return for this donation the Martlet name will be used in connection with the Academy, thus advertising our presence and commitment widely amongst the County's youth. The scheme is being trialled in 1999, and if successful, it will be repeated annually. We will continue to report on the Academy's progress to you, but in the meantime, I hope all members will join me in thanking Richard Moore once again for his vision.
